The New School of Nursing Simulation Lab & Training Center in Plymouth

Curry College opened the new School of Nursing Simulation Lab & Training Center in 2022. Located at our Plymouth Campus in Cordage Commerce Center, the 1,700 square-foot skills lab is designed to support Curry's accelerated pre-licensure baccalaureate and graduate nursing programs as well as to meet the healthcare workforce training needs of the South Shore, the South Coast, and the Cape and Islands.

The new space features a large, simulated healthcare facility complete with five simulation labs and a central nurses' station; a private hospital room simulation lab with a control room; a debriefing room with capabilities to watch simulations play out in real time; and four classrooms equipped with capabilities for both on- or off-site simulcasts and the ability to watch simulations in real time or view recorded simulations.

"Healthcare delivery has become increasingly complex, requiring a more skilled and highly trained caregiver than ever before," said Michelle McMahon, Dean of Curry's School of Nursing. "The Curry College Simulation Lab & Training Center provides a location, high-tech equipment, as well as access to faculty experts, to deliver programming to ensure lifelong skill competency for healthcare and emergency care providers. We look forward to becoming a preferred health education partner, making this center a valuable resource for the surrounding communities."

In 2023, the School of Nursing received the International Nursing Association Clinical Simulation and Learning (INACSL) Endorsement for its simulation program, which includes recognition of both its Milton and Plymouth simulation sites.

Joining 23 elite programs recognized globally, the Curry College School of Nursing is just one of two Massachusetts programs to receive the endorsement and is the first school of nursing based in a private college in Massachusetts to receive the honor.

Equitable education is centered around the belief that everyone deserves the same access to learning opportunities, says Professor Giordana Basta.

Now in her third year as director of Curry's Graduate Programs in Education, Dr. Basta set in motion a path for her students to understand what that means as they consider careers in the field. With the help of colleagues, Dr. Basta has now established a chance for students to earn an M.Ed. in Diverse and Equitable Instruction (DEI) at Curry.


Aimed at "creating inclusive learning communities," the DEI master's is an interdisciplinary program that includes classes such as Fundamentals of Social-Emotional Learning (SEL); Diverse Perspectives in Mathematics; Neurodiversity and Neuroeducational Assessments; Equity, Ethics, and Educational Law; and Social Justice and Educational Advocacy. The 31-credit course of study culminates with a master's thesis.

"Equitable education means many different things," says Dr. Basta, an SEL expert who has consulted for school districts across the U.S., including the Commonwealth of Massachusetts Department of Elementary and Secondary Education. "It means the resources that are available to students; it means how instruction is delivered to students; it means thoughtful consideration to the modalities in which learning is presented. It boils down to a belief system that all people deserve the same access to education, that there are multiple entry points for all learners."

Equity is what provides the framework for coursework design in the DEI master's program, grounded in the idea that educators are charged with providing an environment that promotes that inclusivity. In planning for this track, Dr. Basta convened a DEI committee and solicited multiple perspectives, while also committing to hiring faculty with diverse perspectives to deliver the education.

In addition to her leadership within Curry, Dr. Basta also has established outside partnerships with the Plymouth and Weymouth School Districts in Massachusetts to offer courses in equitable education and inclusive practices to local public school teachers. While 12 graduate students are currently enrolled in the DEI program, and multiple Curry grad students are taking the DEI classes as electives, Dr. Basta shares that 50 educators from Weymouth have begun the coursework as part of a district-wide initiative.

FACULTY MENTORSHIP



HAILEY GONSALVES '23

Forensic Science, Biology

Hailey Gonsalves '23 has a dream – to one day work in a crime lab.

Specifically, she wants to test the biological trace evidence - the materials commonly collected from crime scenes - to help catch the perpetrators.

So, when she was applying to college, she found that Curry College would be just the right fit for her career aspirations.

Hailey chose Curry knowing she would get a unique learning experience conducting faculty-led research, which is a requirement for all students in the sciences here. "The experience I've received doing research will be so valuable to me once I enter the workforce, and this is something you just won't get at other schools," she said. Not only is she conducting high-level research, but she's also able to do it right here on campus.

Hailey is part of the Decomposition and Theoretical (D.E.A.T.H.) Ecology Laboratory research group, which is led by Dr. Samantha Sawyer, Forensic Entomologist and Assistant Professor in the Department of Natural Sciences and Mathematics. Hailey and her lab mates investigate the geospatial and temporal variation of wildlife and necrophagous flies, as well as the influence of increased surface area to volume ratio of remains on necrophagous insect production. All phases of research have been conducted on Curry soil, utilizing its ideal environmental conditions.

With Curry's small class sizes built for one-one-one support, Hailey has loved the opportunity to form personal connections with her faculty colleagues. "My favorite part about faculty-led research is creating a close connection with my professors while gaining first-hand knowledge and advice in their field. I've learned so much from our research advisors, Dr. Sawyer and Dr. (Elizabeth) Wade, who are both always there to help and support me."

Hailey has gained valuable exposure to the process and professionalism of research in both the biology and forensic science career fields and will be included as an author of a publication in her research findings. "Undergraduate students across the board rarely have the ability to publish," said Dr. Sawyer. "At Curry, our students can be listed as the first authors, and in a highly competitive job market, that really stands out."

For Skubie Mageza, it's always been about reps.

Back in his Curry days, when Mageza was a star athlete for the Colonels football team, his coach would often ask him and his teammates where they see themselves in five years. His answer? Working for ESPN.

"I moved to Boston when I was seven years old from Zimbabwe with just my mother and my brother," he said. "There's something about that immigrant mindset because you come to the land of opportunity and it's all or nothing, sink or swim type of thing. And getting to ESPN was a 'this is why we came to this country' moment."

He was only about two years off, but Mageza eventually worked his way up from operating the teleprompter at a local Boston news station in the middle of the night to working as a digital sports host for the largest sports broadcast network in the world.

His journey was anything but a straight path, but the Communication major took every experience as a life lesson, and never passed on an opportunity to get his reps in.

One of those experiences includes his first on-air role in Alpena, Michigan, home of the second smallest TV market in the country. When his contract was up, he accepted a job in Davenport, Iowa as a sports anchor, where he was able to flourish creatively and build up his on-air personality. That creativity is what caught the attention of ESPN.

And in September of 2021, Mageza got the call he'd been waiting for since he was seven—his dreams of becoming an on-air host for ESPN were now a reality.

Enjoying every moment of his new career, Mageza looks back to younger self with pride.

"We came here with a dream, and I was able to achieve one of my own. I understand that I have a testimony. I have a story and I try and inspire and empower others by telling them how I overcame adversity. We came to this country with pretty much nothing, and we got to this point where we have what we want. There's a lot to be said about that."
