

# THE INSTALLATION OF Jay Gonzalez AS FIFTEENTH PRESIDENT OF CURRY COLLEGE

Friday April 12, 2024 Milton, Massachusetts

## The Board of Trustees of Curry College named Jay Gonzalez as the College's 15th president in May, 2023. He took office on July 31, 2023 as the first Hispanic leader of the College.

Most recently, Gonzalez served as a partner at Hinckley Allen, where his primary practice was representing cities, towns, and other governmental entities in financing and developing capital projects and other governmental programs. His work included providing legal and strategic advice to the Massachusetts State College Building Authority in connection with its financing of projects at the state university and community college campuses and to the City of Salem in connection with the development of its port to serve as a terminal for offshore wind development.

Gonzalez began his career as a public finance lawyer and eventually became a partner at Edwards Angell Palmer & Dodge (now Locke Lord). After the election of Massachusetts Governor Deval Patrick, he left the legal profession to work in state government and was appointed to serve as the Secretary of Administration and Finance. In that role, Gonzalez successfully managed a \$32 billion state budget during the Great Recession and oversaw over 3,500 employees in 18 state agencies including the Department of Revenue and agencies responsible for state facilities, human resources, information technology, procurements, and other administrative functions. In this role, he also served on various state boards and commissions.

After his time in state government, Gonzalez served as the president and CEO of Celticare Health Plan of Massachusetts and New Hampshire Healthy Families, which provided health insurance coverage to low-income people in state Medicaid programs. Following his time in health care, Gonzalez was a Democratic candidate for Governor of Massachusetts and was elected to be the Democratic nominee for the 2018 general election. From 2020-2022, he was an adjunct lecturer at Northeastern University School of Law. Gonzalez has been actively engaged in a number of public, civic, and charitable causes, including serving on the boards of various nonprofit organizations. In 2021, he served as a co-chair of the committee overseeing Michelle Wu's transition into the office of mayor of Boston.

Gonzalez was born and raised in Cleveland, Ohio. He earned his bachelor of arts from Dartmouth College in 1993 and his law degree from Georgetown University Law Center in 1996. He moved to Boston in 1998. Gonzalez is married to Cyndi Roy Gonzalez, and he has two daughters, Isabel and Abby. Earlier this year, they moved to the Curry College campus together with Curry's first community support dog, Alexander Graham Bell, who was named after the famous Curry College Chancellor and who is known around campus as "Graham."

#### HISTORY OF CURRY COLLEGE

Since its founding in 1879, Curry College has been an innovative institution of higher education that emphasizes individualized education and personal development. The College's rich history, with roots in the intellectual traditions of 19th-century New England, is foundational to its character. Today, Curry maintains a distinctive mission and commitment to student success, while creatively transforming itself over the years to meet new educational challenges.

Curry College originated as the Boston-based School of Elocution and Expression established in 1879 by Anna Baright, a leading scholar in the field of oratory. She married Samuel Silas Curry, a Boston minister, in 1882. Together they founded the College's direct institutional precursor, the School of Expression, established in 1885 and incorporated in 1888. Anna and Samuel founded the School on the philosophy that individuals could reach their true potential by cultivating the art of expression. Coursework focused on such areas including drama, oratory, and speech. Many other prominent New Englanders were involved in the institution's founding and early growth, including the famous inventor Alexander Graham Bell, a close friend of Samuel, who served as the School's chancellor from 1907-1922.

In 1943, the name was changed to Curry College in honor of its founders and in 1952, Curry moved to its present location in Milton and became a traditional four-year liberal arts college with a strong emphasis on communication and self-development that continues today.

Academically, the College is internationally acclaimed for its Program for Advancement of Learning (PAL), established in 1970 as the nation's first college-level program for students with language-based learning differences. Other recognitions of note include Curry's communication program and award-winning radio station, WMLN FM-91.5 and its School of Nursing, which originally absorbed the Children's Hospital nursing school in 1977.

Today, Curry is recognized as a leading college for individualized education with an emphasis on student success, experiential learning, and outcomes. The focus is on the learning needs of each student, with an average class size of 20 students and a student/faculty ratio of 12:1. The College offers 26 majors and 60-plus minors and concentrations leading to undergraduate degrees and offering graduate degrees in accounting, education, criminal justice, business administration and nursing. The College offers 5th year master's programs in accounting, business administration, education, and criminal justice. Approximately 75% of traditional undergraduates reside on the Curry campus, which offers vibrant student life less than 7 miles from downtown Boston, including 17 NCAA Division III teams and over 40 clubs and organizations. Curry also operates an additional instructional location in Plymouth, Massachusetts.
